Rebecca Hommer, M.D., became interested in the brain and behavior as a research assistant studying macaque development and mother-infant interactions in the lab of Stephen Suomi, Ph.D. She left the lab to attend medical school at the University of Pennsylvania, but returned to the NIH as a 4th year medical student. Under the mentorship of Ellen Leibenluft, M.D., Rebecca worked on neuroimaging projects and gained clinical experience working with children with bipolar disorder and severe mood dysregulation (SMD), leading to her decision to pursue residency training at a program that emphasized child psychiatry research. As a child, adolescent, and adult psychiatry resident in the Albert J. Solnit Training Program at Yale, Rebecca worked on several projects under the mentorship of Linda Mayes, M.D., focusing on adolescent stress reactivity and the neural correlates of stress and appetitive processes. She received an AACAP Pilot Research Award to study the effects of acute and chronic stress on adolescent decision-making. Rebecca recently returned to Dr. Leibenluft’s lab at the NIMH, and she is currently involved in studies comparing SMD youth with and without co-occurring anxiety on clinical and neurophysiological variables and assessing longitudinal outcomes in this population.

Dear Dr. Hamburg,

It is an incredible honor to receive this year's Beatrix A. Hamburg Award from the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. Your dedication to advancing scientific pursuit in psychiatry and, perhaps more importantly, promoting the development of young physician scientists is inspiring. As a newer trainee in child and adolescent psychiatry, the support of a pioneer in the field is exciting and motivating.

The research from which the poster was derived was examining the impact of trauma exposure on neural reward processing in young adults, and how these alterations may be associated with depression and anxiety symptoms. The results supported that trauma-associated changes in neural reward processing are associated with such symptoms; however, the direction of the associations revealed two separate pathways respectively contributing to risk for and resilience against psychiatric symptoms.

The motivation for this project was one that most child and adolescent psychiatrists have – the desire to minimize psychiatric distress and support healthy development in youth. Elucidating pathways of resilience has the potential to lead to intervention development supporting improved outcomes in youth following trauma exposure. With your support and the support of my mentors, Dr. Mary Phillips and Dr. Erika Forbes, I plan to continue building a career in research examining the impact of trauma on brain development. I particularly hope to focus on understanding how underserved communities may be differentially impacted by trauma.

We are writing this letter with much gratitude and honor to have been awarded the 2019 AACAP Beatrix Hamburg, MD Award for the Best New Research Poster by a Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Resident. Our research involved collecting data on adolescents to assess the effects of electronic bullying on mental health and suicide. We are beyond thrilled to have been recognized for our work and to have received an award that has been named after one of the most outstanding and remarkable leaders to have served in the psychiatric community.

Our research used the Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System 2017 to obtain data from all states, to evaluate how electronic bullying impacts the emotional well-being of adolescents. We were also able to assess the gender disparities among these adolescent youth to see who was more likely to be affected. We were able to conclude with great statistical significance that there was a strong association between electronic bullying and adolescents who considered suicide and made suicidal plans with females impacted at higher rates than males. We hope that this research can raise awareness on how electronic bullying impacts the emotional stability of adolescents, as this truly does appear to be a huge component of their lives. Hopefully, future steps can be taken to reduce cyber bullying which in turn may reduce these harmful thoughts. It has truly been a wonderful opportunity to contribute our work on a national platform.

This research is a tribute to Dr. Beatrix Hamburg. She was an inspiring physician who has shaped a pathway for not only physicians who have a strong interest in child and adolescent mental health, but also for women and minority physicians who have a desire to make changes in this population. She has made a profound and impactful contribution to the field historically that shapes our approach on striving for knowledge, providing excellent service and never forgetting compassion for our patients. Receiving this award reminds us of the challenges that have been gracefully accomplished by Dr. Beatrix Hamburg and the hope that we too, can pave a pathway for success with hard work, dedication and an ongoing love for the field that holds dear to our hearts.




